Dalia Ravikovich, who died in 2005, was one of the most distinctive voices in contemporary Hebrew literature and the Israeli peace movement.

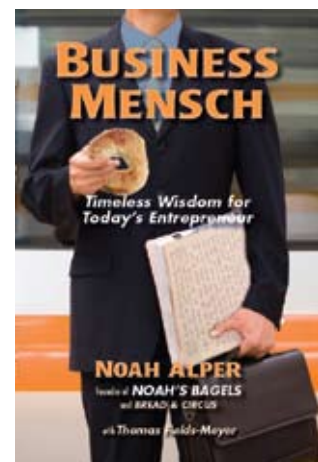
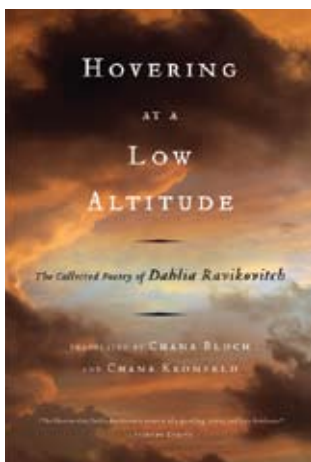
In her poems about everyday Israeli life Ravikovich articulates the painful asymmetries of power. Her poetry reveals her mastery of the verbal art.

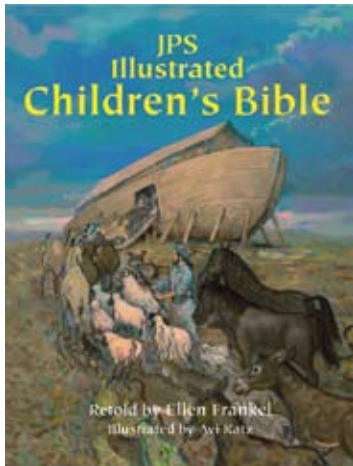


Little People of the Book - Authors Series

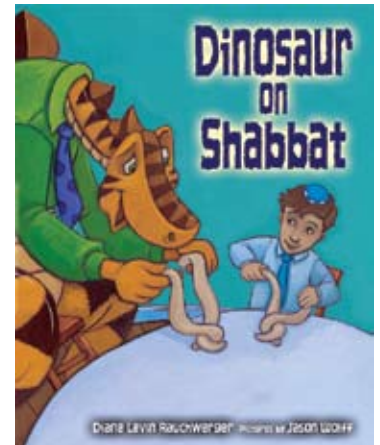

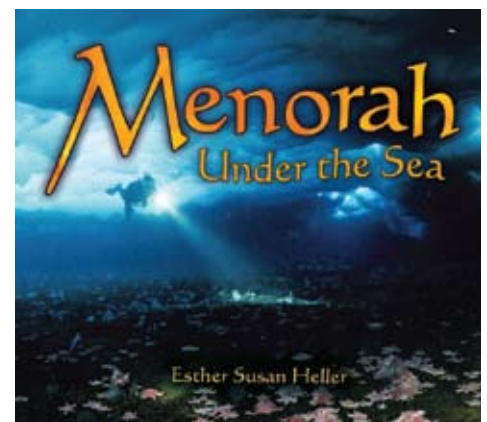

Sunday, November 8, 12:00–5:00 PM

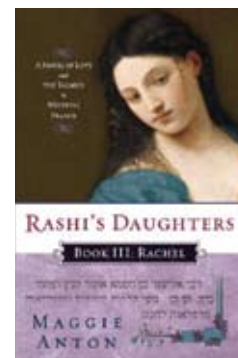
